



THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

First Reading Exodus 34:29-35

Please be seated for the Readings and the Psalm.

Reader A Reading from the Book of Exodus.

Moses came down from Mount Sinai. As he came down from the mountain with the two tablets of the covenant in his hand, Moses did not know that the skin of his face shone because he had been talking with God. When Aaron and all the Israelites saw Moses, the skin of his face was shining, and they were afraid to come near him. But Moses called to them; and Aaron and all the leaders of the congregation returned to him, and Moses spoke with them. Afterwards all the Israelites came near, and he gave them in commandment all that the Lord had spoken with him on Mount Sinai. When Moses had finished speaking with them, he put a veil on his face; but whenever Moses went in before the Lord to speak with him, he would take the veil off, until he came out; and when he came out, and told the Israelites what he had been commanded, the Israelites would see the face of Moses, that the skin of his face was shining; and Moses would put the veil on his face again, until he went in to speak with him.

Second Reading

1 Corinthians 12:27-13:13

Reader A Reading from the first letter of Paul to the Corinthians.

Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it. And God has appointed in the church first apostles, second prophets, third teachers; then deeds of power, then gifts of healing, forms of assistance, forms of leadership, various kinds of tongues. Are all apostles? Are all prophets? Are all teachers? Do all work miracles? Do all possess gifts of healing? Do all speak in tongues? Do all interpret? But strive for the greater gifts. And I will show you a still more excellent way. If I speak in the tongues of mortals and of angels, but do not have love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. And if I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. If I give away all my possessions, and if I hand over my body so that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing. Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never ends. But as for prophecies, they will come to an end; as for tongues, they will cease; as for knowledge, it will come to an end. For we know only in part, and we prophesy only in part; but when the complete comes, the partial will come to an end. When I was a child, I spoke like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child; when I became an adult, I put an end to childish ways. For now we see in a mirror, dimly, but then we will see face to face. Now I know only in part; then I will know fully, even as I have been fully known. And now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love.



Holy Gospel Luke 9:28-36


Please remain standing for the Gospel, which is censed with frankincense and myrrh as a way of giving honor to the ancient account of the life, death, and resurrection of Our Lord. It is customary to make three small signs of the cross with one's thumb on the forehead, lips, and heart, asking God for the Gospel to be in our minds, on our lips, and in our hearts.

Now about eight days after these sayings Jesus took with him Peter and John and James, and went up on the mountain to pray. And while he was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became dazzling white. Suddenly they saw two men, Moses and Elijah, talking to him. They appeared in glory and were speaking of his departure, which he was about to accomplish at Jerusalem. Now Peter and his companions were weighed down with sleep; but since they had stayed awake, they saw his glory and the two men who stood with him. Just as they were leaving him, Peter said to Jesus, 'Master, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah'—not knowing what he said. While he was saying this, a cloud came and overshadowed them; and they were terrified as they entered the cloud. Then from the cloud came a voice that said, 'This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him!' When the voice had spoken, Jesus was found alone. And they kept silent and in those days told no one any of the things they had seen.







"PLANNING FOR THE END OF LIFE" LENT 2025 MEDICAL DIRECTIVES

Dear Members and Friends of Grace Church in Newark,

On Ash Wednesday our liturgy invites us to contemplate our mortality - "remember that we are but dust." Last year in the spirit of the penitential season of Lent, Grace Church began a 3-year "Planning for the End of Life" series to consider making certain decisions now, before the time comes for us to depart from this life. We began last year by writing out what our desires are for our funerals. This year we will focus on medical directives and representatives. Next year we will consider our wills.

This planning is not only for our own peace of mind, but it is also a gift to our family and church. While we are of sound mind, we can consider what kinds of medical treatment we wish to accept or refuse in various circumstances. During serious illnesses, comas, or near the time of death, we can become unconscious and unable to communicate with medical teams and family. Would we like various interventions, such as CPR, ventilator, transfusions, nutrition and hydration, or major surgery? In these circumstances we need our family and a healthcare proxy to communicate to medical professionals on our behalf. Our wishes won't be known, unless they have been written down beforehand.

A medical directive, also called an advance directive, or living will, lays out our wishes for medical care given at the end of life. We also are able to appoint a healthcare representative, or proxy, who can ensure your wishes are implemented, and be guided by the principles you lay out beforehand in making unforeseen decisions. The wishes outlined in the advance directive, of course, only go into effect, if we are unconscious or otherwise unable to make a clear decision.

Beginning on the First Sunday in Lent, we will have presentations at coffee hour by two of our own parishioners, Darriea Pigott and Allie Ulrich. Darriea is a nurse and Allie is a healthcare chaplain. During their presentations they will go into greater depth about how to complete a medical directive and will be able to assist in completing one. We will be utilizing the materials from the Five Wishes program (fivewishes.org) and will have sample copies of the official booklets available at coffee hour. These samples can be taken home for you to look over and consider prayerfully in consultation with family. You will be able to complete an official one with Darriea, Allie, or Father Bates, who will be available at coffee hour on Sundays in Lent, excluding the Bishop's Visit on March 30.

It is also never too late to put together your funeral plans, if you were unable last year. I will again have planning forms and can provide guidance, so you can decide things such as what hymns and

readings you would like, whether or not you want your body at the funeral, and whether you want to be cremated or buried. I also will provide further information about pre-purchasing a single or double niche and bronze name plate in the parish's columbarium underneath the High Altar.

This Lent, please join me in making a Medical Directive. Many of us may not want to think about our deaths, but the truth is that we never know when life may end. Church is where we are called to contemplate such things as life, death, and eternity. We are never alone in making difficult decisions such as these, because we are doing them together as a community and with God's help.

MARDI GRAS COFFEE HOUR & BURNING OF PALMS TODAY

ASH WEDNESDAY THIS WEEK

The season of Lent begins this week on Ash Wednesday. This is the day that Episcopalians, along with Christians of many churches, receive ashes on their foreheads. Priests impose them in the shape of the cross with the words "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." We are reminded of our mortality and our need of God's forgiveness.

There will be two masses celebrated, a Said Mass at 12:10 pm and a High Mass at 7 pm. Ashes will also be imposed after Morning Prayer, between 9:30 am - 10:00 am, and before Evening Prayer, 4:30 pm until 5 pm. "For he himself knows whereof we are made; he remembers that we are but dust."

FRIDAY STATIONS OF THE CROSS & BENEDICTION OF THE BLESSED SACRAMENT FOLLOWED BY A SIMPLE SOUP SUPPER

On Fridays during Lent, Grace Church gathers for Stations of the Cross and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament, two ancient devotions of the Church. During Stations, we make a "pilgrimage" throughout the church, stopping at 14 stations to prayerfully reflect on the events of Christ's Passion. Benediction follows Stations, where the people adore and are blessed by the Blessed Sacrament, in which Christ's presence is real among us. There is a simple soup supper and a time of fellowship after the service. If you would like to bring a soup for one of the Fridays, there is a sign-up sheet on the table in the Parish Hall.

SPONSORS FOR HOLY WEEK SINGERS

The chant and music of Holy Week is a large part of what makes our observance solemn and reverent. Much of the music, such as the Passion chant and the Reproaches on Good Friday, requires additional voices. To help defray the cost, we are asking parishioners to consider sponsoring a singer for \$115 each. Please let us know by using the sheet at the sign-up table at coffee hour. Please also make sure to include the memo "Holy Week singer" in your donation and you may also wish to indicate if it is given in memorial. Wolff von Roos would also be glad to chat about our volunteer choir and tuition-free Choir School.

LENTEN ROSARY PRAYER GROUP

A Rosary prayer group will be offered on Sunday, March 23 & Sunday, April 6. After visiting coffee hour in the Parish Hall, bring your pastries & coffee back down to the parlor and join us for this brief, Scripture-rooted devotion. All are welcome, no matter your experience with praying the Rosary. There will be a short "guide" provided to help during the group and also for personal use at home. FORWARD MOVEMENT'S "LENT MADNESS"

Each Lent, Forward Movement puts on "Lent Madness," an online tournament-like single elimination bracket featuring 32 saints. Yes, like basketball's March Madness, except the Church's Holy Men & Holy Women are competing against each other to win "The Golden Halo," the prize awarded to the "saintliest" saint of the year's line-up. Previous winners have included Julian of Norwich, Mary Magdalene, Absalom Jones and Francis of Assisi. Participants vote online for their favorite of the two saints "competing" that day by selecting their favorite of the saints' biographies that are provided. The winner advances in the competition. It was developed by the Rev. Tim Schenck to be a fun and engaging way for Episcopalians of all ages to learn about the people who make up our Church's Calendar of Saints.

"Lent Madness" will begin Thursday, March 6 and conclude on Holy Wednesday.
